Grant Objectives

- 1. Provide resources for community-driven projects to address environmental and climate challenges
- 2. Invest in strong cross-sectoral collaborations
- 3. Unlock access to additional resources to advance environmental and climate justice goals
- Empower communities and strengthen their capacity to drive meaningful positive change.
- 5. Strengthen community participation in government decision-making processes

Key Information

Application Deadline: November 21, 2024*

*Applications are accepted on rolling basis. Funding may runout before the deadline.

Grant Duration: 3 years max

Amount:

- \$10-20 million for Track 1
- \$1-3 million for Track 2

Initial Review: February 2024 with selections in March 2024

Benefits must flow to disadvantaged communities



Funding Tracks

Track 1: Community-Driven Investments for Change


- Primary emphasis of the grant program
- Focused on getting "shovels in dirt"
- 150 projects
- \$10-20 million per project

Track 2: Meaningful Engagement for Equitable Governance

- Supports participation in government decision-making
- Focus is on planning processes
- 20 projects
- \$1-3 million per project

Defining Disadvantaged Communities

All communities being counted as "disadvantaged" must be highlighted in orange on the EPA IRA Disadvantaged Communities Map, a farmworker community, or a Disadvantaged Unincorporated Community.





Track 1 Requirements

- 1. Climate Action Strategy
- 2. Pollution Reduction Strategy
- 3. Community Engagement and Collaborative Governance Plan
- 4. Community Strength Plan
- 5. Readiness Approach
- 6. Compliance Plan

Climate Action Strategies

1. Green Infrastructure and Nature-based Solutions

Planting shade trees, restoring wetlands

2. Mobility and Transportation Options

Installing bike lanes, deploying low-emission transportation options

3. Resilient Housing and Buildings

• Energy efficiency upgrades, cool roofing

4. Microgrid Installation

Construct and install microgrid infrastructure

5. Community Resilience Hubs

• Emergency communications systems, building retrofits

6. Brownfields Redevelopment

• Implement greening efforts, acquire land for redevelopment

7. Waste Reduction to Support a Circular Economy

Implement a composting program, reduce emissions from food waste

8. Workforce Development to Reduce Air Pollutants

 Multi-sectoral partnerships, high-quality training models, recruitment strategy

Pollution Reduction Strategies

1. Indoor Air Quality

Upgrade HVACs, remediate harmful substances

2. Outdoor Air Quality

• Electrifying vehicles, replacing toxic outdoor surfaces

3. Clean Water Infrastructure

Replacing lead lines, preparing and applying for other federal grants

4. Safe Management of Hazardous Waste

 Develop hazardous waste disposal programs, reduce demand for single use plastics.

- Project Area Map
- Community Engagement and Collaborative Governance Plan: 10 pages
- Community Strength Plan: 5 pages
- Readiness Approach: No limit
- Compliance Plan: 5 pages
